Learning takes many forms. Perhaps the most effective learning is that which we gain from one another. Our students come here expecting to learn from their professors. Many of them, however, underestimate how much they will learn from their fellow students. Students can enhance their understanding of a range of issues by interacting with students from different backgrounds, ethnicities, and nationalities. And so, it is important we enroll a diverse student body. To internationalize the curriculum, we are establishing partnerships and exchange programs with institutions in Denmark. And we are looking for opportunities in other countries. Our faculty members sponsor and lead international study trips. The faculty also has committed to including "global awareness" as one of the cornerstone outcomes of our next core curriculum. In addition, we welcome international students. This year, 30 international students represent 14 different countries on our campus. I invite you to meet some of them in the pages that follow.

Informal learning from interactions with international visitors can be powerful. I think of my own experiences. Having grown up in a small northeastern Iowa farming community, I did not spend time with someone from another country until I was in college. Gregor was from Germany, and he lived in my housing unit. A favorite late afternoon activity was to watch re-runs of sitcoms. It took a while to notice. but Gregor would always quietly slip out when "Hogan's Heroes" came on. One day, we finally caught on and what ensued was an interesting conversation about his reactions to how Germans were depicted in that show. It was not terribly significant, but it was probably the first time I learned

firsthand that people from other cultures and countries might react differently to things we considered ordinary.

Later in college, I had the opportunity to travel abroad, as did my wife. Because we stayed with so many host families across Europe, Carole and I always have opened our home to international visitors. It's our way of "paying it forward." We have hosted two foreign exchange students, one from France and one from Belgium. We have also hosted visiting performers from a Russian choir, a German symphony, the Danish gymnastics performance team, and most recently, students from the Vejle (Denmark) business school.

We have learned a great deal from each of these groups of guests. For example, our conversations with educators from Denmark have helped me participate in our statewide dialog about education reform, because lowa's education leaders are looking to successes in other countries.

About ten years ago, a group of practicing teachers – women in their 30s and 40s – from Russia were in this area learning about our school system. After the demise of communism, they were learning how their schools needed to change to support their emerging "democracy" and free-market economy. Over the three weeks

Donors making campus transformation possible through generous gifts. two of the Russian teachers were guests in our home, we had many conversations about a wide range of topics, often lasting too late into the evening. We learned about their impressions of America during the Cold War. More striking, we learned that our impressions of life in the Soviet Union were not always accurate, perhaps shaped by our own version of "propaganda." It was profound to hear them express disappointment in some of what they lost when communism collapsed, and their experiences with capitalism were not all positive.

Not unlike my first encounter with Gregor when I was a college sophomore, I have continued to gain new perspectives by interacting with all these international visitors. In the process, I have renewed my love and respect for my own country and have deepened my desire for international peace.

I sincerely hope the majority of Grand View students will benefit from their own conversations with our international students. And I hope our students – and you – also will make hosting visitors from other countries a part of their – and your – lifelong learning, with the conviction that better international understanding will lead to peace. But once again, this institutional priority is not new. One of the folk songs our founders brought with them and taught to those first generations of Grand View students was "Song of Peace." The lyrics capture the spirit of what we now call internationalizing the campus:

This is my song, O God of all the nations A song of peace for lands afar and mine; This is my home, the country where my heart is

This is my hope, my dream, my shrine; But other hearts in other lands are beating With hopes and dreams the same as mine.

My country's skies are bluer than the ocean And sunlight beams on cloverleaf and pine, But other lands have sunlight too, and clover

And skies are sometimes blue as mine. O hear my song, Thou God of all the nations,

A song of peace for their land, and mine.

International understanding lives on at Grand View.

GV CONTINUES TO EXPERIENCE GROWTH

Grand View has seen significant growth recently – in more ways than one!

This fall brought another record enrollment, with a 6.8% increase in full-time enrollment, bringing it to 1,801 students. Along with the jump in fulltime numbers, GV also increased total enrollment, which reached 2,229, and we welcomed the largest freshman class in our history. Our international student population also increased. This fall we enrolled 30 students from 14 countries, a jump from 11 countries last fall.

According to Debbie Barger, vice president for enrollment management, there are several reasons for the increase. "We attribute our growth to new academic programs, growth in our athletic programs – including the addition of tennis, competitive cheer, and men's volleyball – as well as new facilities, and a general positive interest and increased awareness," Barger said. "There is a lot happening right now at Grand View."

The addition of four new sports brings our total number of sports offerings to 24 – 12 for men and 12 for women. For the inaugural season, we currently have nine women's tennis and five men's tennis

players, 18 competitive cheer athletes, and 18 men's volleyball players. Bowling was added last fall.

GV is also becoming an increasingly residential campus with a recordbreaking number of students living on campus. All campus housing facilities are full, with 801 students living on campus, a 31% increase over last year. To help accommodate the growing enrollment, the L Apartments, GV's newest apartment-style building, was completed in time for fall move-in and is at capacity, housing 232 students. The new building is in addition to the Langrock Suites, built in 2007, the Hull Apartments, and the two freshman residence halls.

According to president Kent Henning, "We'll continue to look at investment in new student-centered

ART STUDIO HOUSE OPEN TO SENIORS

This campus house was transformed into art workspace apartments for senior art students.

"I'm really excited that we're able to make this opportunity available for our seniors who are serious about making their own art," Aaron Tinder, professor of art and design, said. "It gives them a fantastic opportunity not only to work in a more prolific way, but to build community as they prepare for the world of art that exists after undergraduate

education. It's another way that our department is working to strengthen and support the things we believe students need."

This is the first year the studio house is open. Seniors majoring in visual arts were encouraged to apply for one of six studio apartment spaces in the house. The students were selected by the

art faculty based on their applications, submitted artwork samples, and the work ethic displayed throughout their time at GV. If students are selected for a space in the house, there is an additional fee for the year to help cover the house expenses. The selected students sign contracts and are given a key to the house for twenty-four hour access.

"So far we have great positive response to the studio house," Tinder said. "We plan to eventually host open houses for the campus community to





come see what the house is all about and what seniors are working on for their senior shows."

The studio house is not formally attached to a class. Seniors who have space in the house continue to attend classes; the studio house is intended as a space to work on personal art and to prepare pieces for their senior shows. **Gy**

LIBRARY OUTREACH INITIATIVES

BY LACIE SIBLEY '07, EDITOR The Grand View library offers numerous resources to students that many do not take advantage of...so the librarians are stepping outside the library doors and bringing resources to the students. Several outreach initiatives have been put in place to help bridge the gap between the student and the library.

RESEARCH TO-GO

Some find the library intimidating – not knowing how to start a search or the most effective means of finding credible resources – so they don't even venture through the doors. Others believe they can do it on their own, but grades can speak to the fact that maybe they should have sought a little extra assistance.

Research To-go is a new program this year. Librarians are packing up their laptops and iPads and stationing themselves around campus, equipped to assist students between classes with research needs. The library is working with a Project Management class to help publicize this new program and learn the best approaches to reach students. They hope that by making the library more accessible and convenient, more students will use the library resources available to them. Librarians plan to set up in various locations across campus during been functioning for three years. The library partners with faculty and visits their classes four to eight times a year, teaching pieces of the research process and building on each class meeting in a stair-step manner. The faculty who have participated in the program have seen a

Enrollment at Grand View has grown tremendously

in recent years. And part of that growth is our international student population. Just last year we enrolled students representing 11 countries; this fall that number has grown to 14 countries. We now have 30 international students on campus taking advantage of all that Grand View has to offer.

"The diversity among international students has increased this year. We have students from four continents represented on campus," Alex Piedras, international student advisor and director of multicultural and community outreach, said. "These students add so much to our GV community – different cultures, languages, customs. Our students who haven't travelled outside the United States get exposed to new thinking and perspectives."


Unlike many larger universities, Grand View doesn't participate with paid international recruiting services, nor do we actively recruit international students in the same way we recruit high school and transfer students. Many international students find us through study abroad programs at their high schools, and some are introduced to Grand View through our virtual visit events at CollegeWeekLive. Others come to us for athletics, because many of our coaches work with recruiting agencies that connect student-athletes with coaches internationally.

Head men's soccer coach, Blair Reid, works closely with athletic recruiting firms to bring in top-notch players.

"International students enrich the campus community," Reid said. "They appreciate the opportunity to play the sport and get an education. For many students overseas, it is very difficult to get into a university in their native country. Many of our international students finish their degrees here, then go on to graduate school and successful careers."

Our American students value the friendships and interactions they have with the international students. They recognize the importance of having





diversity in their lives and know that once they graduate they will encounter even more people with different backgrounds, values and ways of living.

Senior Kate Burnette said, "It's important and a privilege to have international students on campus because the various cultures represented by these students promotes a diverse and unique college experience for everyone. It has been interesting getting to know these students on campus and how similar and different their lives at home are to ours here in the U.S. Also, from the perspective of a soon-to-be graduate, I know that many jobs will involve interaction and relationships with people of varied racial, cultural, religious and socio-economic backgrounds – it's important to learn to work with, appreciate and love individuals who are different from ourselves."

Juston Meier, senior biology major, agrees. He is good friends with a student from Colombia, and they work together to improve his Spanish-speaking skills. They speak to each other or text in Spanish and she corrects him if needed.

"I think it's a great opportunity to have international students on campus. It helps other people become well rounded and educated on the different cultures of the world," Meier said.

Regardless of how international students become aware of Grand View, our admissions counselors explain

> the admission process and the proper documentation students will need to enroll, and then help them through the process. International students are eligible for academic and athletic scholarships, just like American students.

We will introduce you to just a few of our international students and encourage you to step out of yourself and into their shoes. Imagine what it's like to fly thousands of miles away from your home, your family, your friends, and try to establish yourself at a college where the only person you might know is your coach or your admissions counselor. These students have done exactly that.

LIDIJA CAKIC • Serbia • Senior • Nursing

In 2003, Lidija Cakic arrived in New York as a tourist, staying with her cousin before applying for a student visa. She visited Des Moines for a short time and then moved to New Orleans, where she taught herself English. The following year she found herself back in Des Moines where she earned her RN degree from Des Moines Area Community College. Afterward, she moved to Colorado where she worked as a registered nurse for the Department of Corrections, and now she has returned to Des Moines to earn her nursing degree and psychology minor.

Cakic chose Grand View for the nursing program and for the fact that nursing classes are offered on campus and not online. As an international student, she is required to be enrolled and to attend classes on campus. She has been very pleased with her GV experience so far and really enjoys the faculty and staff.

"Everyone is so welcoming," Cakic said. "And my admissions counselor was very patient and helpful when working to get me enrolled. I love Des Moines – there are some very beautiful areas."

Cakic said the school system in Serbia is quite different from America. Children ages five to seven have the option of attending preschool and usually start elementary school, which lasts eight years, at age seven. Then they have the choice of attending high school for three or four years. Cakic said exams in Serbia are very difficult. For each course, students are graded in oral and written exam format. Oral exams consist of going to the board while the professor randomly opens the textbook and asks questions. Written exams are usually fill in the blank or short essays.

"In fifth grade, at age 12, we start taking a foreign language course, which is required," Cakic said. "We have the choice of English, Russian, German or French. Physics and chemistry are also required at that time."

The most challenging part of being an international student is being away from her family. Cakic has a twin sister, an older sister and a half brother. Her father is retired and her mother passed away in 2009 after the bombing in Serbia ended. Cakic has not seen her family since first coming to the States in 2003.

The Hope Fund is a small non-profit organization that a Palestinian-American and his wife started at their kitchen table in Virginia after reading a news article about a poor young man and his journey to obtain an education. The organization worked to identify Palestinian refugees who, like that young man, desired an education and had the drive, but didn't have the financial means. Through this husband and wife's personal contributions and those from a limited number of donors, the organization reached agreements with various American colleges to provide scholarships to refugees. The organization paid for the students' travel, medical insurance and anything they needed to be successful college students.

lyyad Rayyan is a recipient of a Hope Fund scholarship. Through the help of his advisor, Rayyan qualified for the program. He reviewed a list of colleges, chose Grand View and recently began his educational journey toward a degree in finance. "I plan to work for a couple years after I graduate and then work on getting my master's degree in investment-related finance," Rayyan said.

Since arriving on campus, Rayyan has noticed several differences between life in the states and life in Palestine. Colleges back home are larger, with a bigger student enrollment than Grand View. Palestinian high school students are required to take official exams their senior year, and the results determine their educational future and life in general.

"I don't think I had any real problems learning the language in the U.S., but the culture is quite different," Rayyan said. "I do like how Grand View helps students grow and mature and learn to be considerate of their actions – this is most obvious when I look at freshmen and senior behaviors."

For Rayyan, American culture differs greatly from that of other countries. He said he noticed differences as soon as his feet were on American soil and, sadly, it was the immediate stereotyping of Arab people. However, he also found that people at Grand View truly make an effort to listen and understand, and if they can't help him they go the extra mile to find someone who can. With some amusement, Rayyan said the texting issue in the States is remarkable.

"Everyone is texting all the time – people who are walking, eating, studying, even talking with someone, they are still texting!" Rayyan said.

Not all students in Puerto Rico have the option of studying in the United States, some for economic reasons and others because they just can't be away from family – and the familiar – for that long. But Victor "VJ" Gonzalez, jumped at the opportunity when it came.

"My family is very important to me," Gonzalez said. "My mom is my number one fan. My dad is very supportive also, and my little brother is following my footsteps as a volleyball athlete. My whole family is very proud and happy that I have this experience. The most challenging thing about it is being away from them and adapting to the English language."

Gonzalez is intrigued by the relationship between science and technology and is working to obtain a biotechnology degree. If he weren't studying in the U.S., he would be going to a university back home, working toward a degree in biology. The Puerto Rican university does not offer a biotechnology degree.

"I want to study medicine, and I have to begin with a science major," Gonzalez said. "I like the relationship between science and technology, and I think that kind of science is the future."

Part of his decision to attend Grand View was the biotechnology major and his athletic scholarship. Head men's volleyball coach Donan Cruz recruited Gonzalez. He invited him to campus and after a tour and getting to know his future coach, Gonzalez knew Grand View was the right place for him. Along with a career in the science field, Gonzalez would also like to pursue a professional volleyball career.

PER POULSEN Denmark • Junior Business Administration: Marketing

Per Poulsen attended a community college in New York where he played soccer before transferring to Grand View. In his native Denmark, he learned that he could play soccer and further his education at the same time in an American school. So, after making a one-year agreement with a coach at Monroe Community College in Rochester, N.Y., Poulsen was on a plane to the States.

"I was looking for a great soccer program and a scholarship to play," Poulsen said. "Grand View could offer both."

Poulsen was a little worried about going to an American school; he wasn't sure he would fit in with the culture and lifestyle. However, once he made it to campus he was pleasantly surprised at how helpful and willing the campus community was to make him feel at home.

"It's nice to be surrounded by people who care and are willing to help me out," Poulsen said. "I was most worried that my English would not be good enough for people to understand me, but it's been nothing but a pleasure being here."

> Soccer is a large part of why Poulsen is here, and he feels the team is very much like a family. He's also impressed by the commitment and support from the Grand View campus community. Although he's noticed some differences in American sports

compared to Danish athletics, the experience has been very rewarding. "I love that there are more international students, and especially

Europeans. It makes it easier to have someone who knows where you are from and can relate to that a bit more," Poulsen said. "Sports are a bit more physical here, and it's not always about soccer skills but about

athletic ability."

Poulsen never attended college in Denmark but said the system is quite different. It takes three years to obtain a Bachelor's degree, and students do not live on campus. Because of that, they don't interact or get to know each other like students do in America. Danish colleges offer sports, but the number of student activities is limited.

"It is unique to go to a university here," Poulsen said. "I know there are universities in Denmark that offer students the chance to attend an American college for a semester or year, but few take the opportunity to do it. So, returning home with a degree from here will benefit me when looking for a job."

ROSS ALEXANDER • United Kingdom • Freshman • Physical Education

For Ross Alexander, the best thing about Grand View is the relationships he's built with the members of his soccer team. They are a very cohesive group, a family – they welcomed him and made him feel right at home.

> "The most difficult thing about being here is adapting to the fact that I can't see my family or friends whenever I want," Alexander said. "It's hard, but at the end of the day I know it's worth it. Grand View has been brilliant, just a lot of homework, but that keeps me from thinking too much about home."

He enjoys being a studentathlete and is grateful for the opportunity. Not only does he get to play soccer – which he has done since he was five years old – he also gets to work toward a degree. "College" and "University" are two very different institutions in Scotland. Students may attend college after high school but cannot obtain a degree there. University offers the opportunity to earn a degree, but students must have high grades to be accepted.

"Being at Grand View is a chance at an education I would not have had back home," Alexander said.

Through Sporting Futures USA, Alexander had several American schools looking at him. He chose Grand View because of Coach Blair Reid's influence and the record and reputation of the Vikings. Without his scholarship to Grand View, Alexander said he would probably be working a low-paid job with few opportunities for the future.

"This is a unique chance to combine an education with playing soccer," Alexander said. "There are many people back home wishing for this chance, so I feel very honored to come here and have this experience."

After he graduates, Alexander hopes to return to Scotland and build a successful career as a physical education teacher. He's not set on that for sure because he really enjoys the States...but he's unsure if he could be away from his "mum" for that long.

NICOLE MCDONALD • Canada • Sophomore • Biology

During her last year of high school in Canada, Nicole McDonald participated in a program called College Prospects of America. While in this program, she created a profile that included her grades and golf scores, and this profile was sent to more than 500 American colleges. Approximately 40 schools contacted McDonald, and Grand View was one of them.

"I chose to come to Grand View mostly because it was a smaller school, and I knew I would have the one-on-one attention from professors if I needed it," McDonald said. "The golf coach was also very convincing, and I felt that he could help make me a better golf player. The overall atmosphere of the school made me feel like I could see myself here."

As a student-athlete, McDonald said sports at the college level in the States are bigger than in Canada – which is why many Canadian athletes come to the U.S. to play sports. Not only do they have the opportunity to play and improve their athletic skills, they can also further their education.

"I'm really enjoying my experience as a GV student-athlete," McDonald said. "The team does a lot of traveling, so I get to visit places I may not have had the chance to, and this fall we're going to Vancouver, British Columbia, and Canada – really looking forward to that!"

McDonald said there are two different types of post-secondary education in Canada – university or college. Canadian universities grant degrees and are larger institutions than colleges. Canadian colleges are more career-oriented and focus on hands-on training. Through campus events, McDonald has met more friends and

been able to experience more of what Des Moines has to offer. She has also enjoyed building relationships with professors and teammates. Des Moines has a big-city atmosphere but also a pleasant, homey feeling that makes being away from her family a little easier.

"The most challenging thing about being here is being away from my friends and family," McDonald said. "I was nervous about coming here, mostly because I wasn't sure if I was really prepared for the demands of college, and I didn't know what to expect being enrolled in an education system in a different country. But I was surprised to realize that I could handle the school work and play golf."

KADDYJATOU JALLOW • Gambia • Sophomore • Nursing

Kaddyjatou Jallow is well on her way to completing her degree in nursing. She has plans to become a pediatric nurse and return home to work in a hospital. In Gambia, Jallow obtained an RN, which was a three-year course, and worked in the surgical unit at the local hospital where she cared for burned children.

When Jallow was looking into studying abroad, she wanted a university that was well recognized, with an accredited nursing program. She researched Grand View and decided it was the right fit for her and has been pleased with her decision. The president of Gambia offers scholarships to students who wish to study abroad; Jallow applied and was granted assistance.

"The people at Grand View are so nice," Jallow said. "And my roommate is awesome! The instructors are helpful and very patient, and the campus environment is perfect for learning."

Although she has a very demanding class schedule - 16 credit hours in six subjects - Jallow is thrilled to be here. Daily tests, guizzes and research are challenging but she's doing well and keeping up.

"My country is a lot smaller, smaller than lowa even, so there are few colleges," Jallow explained. "Course programs are three years and each student has his/her own room, although they are quite small, and the guys and girls live in different buildings."

Jallow also commented on the Iowa climate...Gambia has a rainy season, which is usually hot, and a dry season, which is generally cold. She loves the beautiful beaches, abundant sunshine and kind people -Gambia is nicknamed the Smiling Coast of West Africa. Jallow is looking forward to experiencing snow for the first time.

MAIMUNA JATTA • Gambia • Sophomore • Nursing

Before beginning her study at Grand View, Maimuna Jatta had a completely different expectation of what it means to be an American college student. What she found was that it isn't much different from studying in Gambia.

"College at home is more or less the same as it is here, but the learning system is different," Jatta said. "College at home focuses more on exams than homework. The exam system is more intense, but the challenges at home and here are similar."

Jatta wanted to get the best education she could after she earned a government scholarship to study overseas. The government promotes scholarships for education and building a skill set, and encourages students to return home to work after graduation. Jatta looked into Grand View's location, the crime rate in the Des Moines area, and the standards of education set by Grand View. She had several schools to choose from but was drawn to Grand View's campus community.

"Grand View's community enables great student-professor relationships, which fosters great education," Jatta said. "And that is what I was looking for."

Getting acquainted with campus wasn't as daunting as she expected. Jatta found that her roommates were very helpful as she learned her way around. She enjoys the campus and thinks students are a bit more reserved compared to college students back home, and the weather is quite different.

CONOR THOMAS Ireland • Junior **Business Administration**

After completing two years at the Dublin Business School in Ireland, Conor Thomas transferred to Grand View with the help of PASS4Soccer, a recruiting service dedicated to finding scholarships for talented young athletes in quality postsecondary American schools. "I chose Grand View because of its excellent reputation and the great soccer program," Thomas said. "I also discovered there

were English and Scottish players on the team, along with other Europeans, and it seemed like a nice mix of people."

Thomas is undecided when thinking about his future career. At present, the job outlook in Ireland is bleak. With a business degree, he plans to keep his options open and hopes to find a job.

The people at Grand View were very welcoming and helpful when Thomas arrived on campus. He enjoys the facilities campus has to offer and building camaraderie with his teammates.

"There's always a good buzz on campus and everyone is very helpful," Thomas said. "College days back home are a lot longer and very difficult. I prefer college here because I think it is more fair in terms of the work."

Thomas hasn't encountered any surprises when it comes to his studies. However, American culture and certain rules for young people have shocked him.

"Socializing seems quite strict both on and off campus," Thomas said. Mostly referring to the legal drinking age, Thomas explained that the legal age in Ireland is 18. For college students, no matter where they reside on campus, once they reach that age they are free to partake without issue. Gy


GV TO HOST 2012 NAIA WRESTLING CHAMPIONSHIPS

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) announced in August that Des Moines has been awarded the 2012 NAIA Wresting Championships. Grand View will serve as the local host of the event, working in conjunction with the Des Moines Area Sports Commission, March 1-3, at the Jacobson Exhibition Center at the Iowa State Fairgrounds.

Approximately 320 athletes from around the country will compete, and ten individual national champions will be crowned. Grand View started its wrestling program in 2008 and is one of the top wrestling programs in the nation. During the first three years of competition, the Vikings have crowned three individual champions, placed in the top ten each year. The team placed fifth in 2011.

"Grand View is very excited to be the host of the 2012 NAIA Wrestling Championships," said Grand View Athletic Director Troy Plummer. "The



popularity of wrestling in Des Moines and surrounding areas will make for a great atmosphere for the national event. We look forward to working with the NAIA and the Des Moines Area Sports Commission to provide a quality event for the athletes competing and the coaches and fans attending."

lowa has hosted seven wrestling championships. The 2011 Championships were in Cedar Rapids, and Sioux City hosted the event from 2005-08. The NAIA estimates that 5,000-8,000 fans attend the wrestling championships.

The Championship consists of ten individual weight classes with five sessions during the three-day span. Wrestlers qualify for the Championships in one of three ways: placing in the top four in any weight class at the qualifying group tournament; having a .666 or better winning percentage against four-year accredited intercollegiate competition provided the wrestler participates in a minimum of 12 matches during the regular season; and through an intercollegiate tournament during the season. **Gv**

EMERGING MEN'S VOLLEYBALL PROGRAM

Last year, Grand View announced the addition of four sports, one being men's volleyball, and Athletic Director Troy Plummer named Donan Cruz as the head coach. Cruz currently serves as an assistant coach to the GV women's volleyball program.

The men's volleyball team will join the Mid-American Men's Volleyball Intercollegiate Conference (MAMVIC), which is split into separate divisions – East, West and National. The Vikings will join the West Division. Their opponents include Graceland University, Park University, Missouri Baptist University, Missouri Valley College and Hannibal-LaGrange College.

"Men's volleyball is what they call an emerging sport in the NAIA, which I think is a misconception for a lot of people," Cruz said. "We have a national championship invitational that's sponsored by Tachikara. The top six teams in the country at the end of the year play for a national title."

According to the NAIA, emerging

sports consist of any sport recognized by the NAIA where participating institutions follow all regulations but without an official national championship.

The first NAIA men's volleyball invitational was in 1999, and during this time volleyball was still a recognized sport – meaning 15 institutions in the NAIA declared an intent to participate as a varsity team. Men's volleyball was grandfathered under the 2005 Emerging Sports Plan and will continue to host a National Invitational in the spring. Each

PUTTING ON THE GLOVES TO HELP KIDS

BY LACIE SIBLEY '07, EDITOR Some might be surprised to see an 84-year old man in the boxing ring, but for Carl Hansen '55 it is perfectly natural. Hansen is a certified boxing coach in Palm Beach Gardens, Fla., for a boys and girls boxing program sponsored by the Police Athletic League and Club 100 – a faithbased service group of which Hansen is a member.

"As retired people, we needed to do something, and we decided that we could best serve kids," Hansen said.

Five years ago Club 100 collected \$25,000 to start the boxing program and scouted for a location. They found an old fire station in an area where just a year earlier two young boys died from an overdose. They decided this was the place they could make a difference; they would take in troubled kids, teach them to box and hopefully get them away from potentially bad situations.


"Most of the kids coming into the program are not ready for the ring," Hansen said. "They need to get in shape and train. Many of them are not involved in school sports because they experienced rejection by school coaches for their

lack of physical ability."

Hansen finds joy knowing that the kids who come to his ring develop selfconfidence as they realize they

do have talent and boxing is a healthy alternative to other activities. Most at-risk children have little to take pride in, and through this program, they learn discipline, heart and respect, which makes them feel better about themselves.

The program is free to boys and girls from elementary through high school. Hansen works with Club 100

to raise donations for tournaments and equipment. The Police Athletic League conducts background checks on the volunteers in the program for the safety of the participants.

a coach and mentor is very rewarding." Hansen was born in Denmark during a bad time for the country. At the age of 13, he had completed school up to the seventh grade and was then sent out to be a farmhand. In 1948, he was inducted into the Danish Army and was sent to Germany to join the Danish Brigade. In 1950, Hansen emigrated to the United States with a visitor's visa and a green card so he could be employed. Shortly after he arrived, the U.S. engaged in the Korean War and he was drafted into the U.S. Army in 1951. Since he was not a U.S. citizen, he stayed stateside when the majority of his company was shipped to Korea.

Just before being discharged from the Army, Hansen took college entrance exams in lieu of having a high school diploma and was told he could attend any college he wanted. After speaking with a Danish pastor who had attended Grand View, Hansen applied and was accepted for the fall semester in 1953. After two years at GV, he transferred to the University of Minnesota and graduated with an electrical engineering degree in 1957.

"Grand View was a great way to start my college education," Hansen said. "It gave me a foundation for college life in a larger school after I transferred." Gy
