For CSU courses without a direct equivalent course, general subject and domain codes are assigned ie. Socs-shb = a sociology course that meets Domain Understanding Society and Human Behavior. Any 100/200 level CSU course that transfers in for a 300 or 400 level Grand View Course receives lower division credit (100 or 200) (LD). It will not count toward the 30 Upper Division credit graduation requirement.

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## ESSENTIAL COMPETENCIES

In all classes taken at Grand View, students will be challenged to develop their skills in mastering the six General Education core outcomes: Information Literacy (IL), Written Communication (W), Oral Communication (O), Quantitative Communication (Q), Global Awareness (GA), and Vocation (V). Applications or “iterations” of each of these will appear throughout the curriculum, in the Core Seminars, Domains of inquiry classes, and classes within the student’s major.

Individual transfer courses do not receive specific iterations. Iterations received are based on total number of transfer credits.

### Core Outcome Iterations:

0 – 59\* credits upon admission = 2 iterations required of each outcome

60+ credits upon admission = 1 iterations required of each outcome

*\*Full-time freshmen will be required to complete 2 iterations of each outcome, no matter how many credits they bring in with them, unless they have already completed an Associate in Arts or Associate in Science degree. Full-time freshmen who complete an Associate in Arts or Associate in Science degree prior to initial GV enrollment will be required to complete the number of instances as indicated in the chart above.*

### TRANSFER WITH AN ASSOCIATE IN ARTS OR ASSOCIATE IN SCIENCE DEGREE

The Associate in Arts (AA) and Associate in Science (AS) degrees satisfy the Grand View University General Education Core requirements for the baccalaureate degree except for the composition and quantitative reasoning courses (unless fulfilled by transfer coursework), Core Seminar II, and the number of outcome iterations as indicated in the chart above. Students holding any Associates degree other than an Associate in Arts or Associate in Science degree are not exempt from the general degree requirements.

### TRANSFER WITH A BACCALAUREATE DEGREE

Students holding a baccalaureate degree or higher from an accredited institution based in the United States are considered to have fulfilled all Grand View University General Education Core requirements except for the completion of one iteration of each of the Core outcomes and Core Seminar II. See the University Catalog for details.

Students holding baccalaureate degrees from accredited institutions based outside the United States are frequently considered to have fulfilled all General Education Core requirements except for the completion of one iteration of each of the Core outcomes, Core Seminar II, and composition, though Grand View reserves the right to make a determination of comparability.

Additional graduation requirements can be found in the catalog including, but not limited to, successful completion of a major, earning a minimum of 124 college-level semester credits, and earning at least 30 credits at Grand View. Please review the catalog for additional details.

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
