On behalf of the staff and faculty in the Education Department at Grand View, I would like to thank you for volunteering to serve as mentors for our student teachers. Student teaching serves as an extraordinary culminating experience at the end of their teacher education program. Throughout their time at Grand View, our students are given opportunities to observe in K-12 classrooms where they plan and teach lessons. However, prior to student teaching, they do not have the experience of teaching all day throughout the week, altering their lessons plans to address student needs, or collecting and analyzing assessment data to make crucial instructional decisions.
